Where can we find out more about the 7 clans and which groups are in which areas?

The Mi'kmaq historically occupied a large area of northeastern North America. The Mi'kmaq's original territory covers most of what today comprises Canada's Maritime Provinces, a good part of eastern Quebec, and northern Maine.

The territory was divided into seven distinct "Districts" or "clans." Their names were:

1. Kespukwitk,
2. Sipekne'katik,
3. Eskikewa'kik,
4. Unama'kik,
5. Epekwitk Aqq Piktuk,
6. Siknikt, and
7. Kespek

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Is there a special significance given to the heart organ in this creation story? Especially the human heart? Does the heart stand apart from other organs? If so, how?

The heart represents the spirit; the soul of humanity. It's the blood that flows through us. Also, the blood in our feet is connected to Mother Earth, where all of our ancestors have gone back into the ground and back to Mother Earth, and so their blood is in the water of Mother Earth.
